

Allocation and Modalities

Community Point-In-Time Vaccination Clinics - LHJs and CHCs can be effective at making vaccinations accessible to vulnerable populations that include agricultural workers. By focusing on the community ethnic enclaves where agricultural worker families live, it will increase the chances that a larger proportion of agricultural workers gain access to the vaccines.

On-Site Vaccinations - Mobile on-site vaccination clinics would support the vaccination of an important subset of agricultural workers, foreign H2-A contract workers, that live in congregate settings and may get their groceries in the Ethnic Enclave Communities where domestic agricultural workers live. It is likely that domestic foremen and farm managers will benefit from these on-farm vaccination clinics.

<u>High Throughput Sites</u> - High throughput sites may reach some agricultural workers, but many are excluded from acquiring the vaccine this way by transportation issues, work schedules, family obligations, an unfamiliarity with the process, and language barriers.



This map indicates the location of farmworker housing throughout the state.




Vaccine priorities will be influenced by the extent of outbreaks in agricultural counties.

Communication and Engagement

A communication strategy and coordination plan will exist between DOH, community partners, the Gov's office, other state agency partners, LHJs, Growers/Associations, providers, other states, and other federal agency partners to operationalize this plan until vaccination is completed.

DOH and LHJs will provide focused communication to communities directly through existing channels. DOH will provide broad communication to the public through existing channels. Messaging will be shared between the LHJs and DOH to ensure a consistent message.

Chelan-Douglas: Plan Snapshot

Plans: Have met with clinical providers to divide up agriculture workers based on geographic location. Focus on large local employers to open up and register H2A workers for Mass Vaccinations and support mobile groups to go out to different workers.

Mass Vaccination at TTC: Many of the groups will be able to go to TTC

Cascade Medical Center (Leavenworth): Hoping to reestablish a local free clinic through Upper Valley MEND. Plan to support agricultural workers in DOH assigned tier 1B2. Needs Vaccine.

Columbia Valley Community Health (Multiple Locations): Starting mobile vaccine clinics this week (Thursday 11 March) using a 9-person team dedicated to mobile vaccine delivery. A site-specific calendar is being developed. Requested 200 Moderna through DOH allocation and 100 Johnson & Johnson doses to start DOH assigned tier 182 on 17 March.

Confluence Health (Multiple Locations): Managing the Mass Vaccination Site and supporting outreach to LatinX community through weekend popup clinics. Confluence Health is gearing up to move to a strike team approach to get in more agricultural employees. The strike team can probably do 200 vaccinations a day. Information, education, and communication materials are in development to overcome vaccine hesitancy and promote vaccine equity, including a billboard campaign targeting the Latinx community.

Lake Chelan Community Health (Chelan/Manson): Outreach efforts and drive-through vaccine clinics are being prioritized for agricultural areas

"Our Outreach branch is doing over-the-phone as well as boots-on-the-ground vaccine preregistration and education with individuals in the community, with emphasis on reaching otherwise inaccessible populations. They are currently going door-to-door and distributing flyers in appropriate and relevant sites (agricultural housing, packing sheds, etc.)...

We estimate that we have contact information for approximately 90% of the relevant agricultural business, encampment, and formal agricultural housing entities in our jurisdiction, and intend to continue reaching out to law enforcement, industry interest groups, and so forth in an effort to ensure we get as close to 100% coverage as possible.".


Food Processing Workers

Definition of Done: This population is complete on May 1st or when all designated sites have been provided an opportunity to receive vaccine via an employer on-site clinic.

Population: Includes specifically those who work and/or live in a congregate setting interacting with high volume of co-workers (vs. animals) over extended periods of time (i.e. 3 or more hours in a 24-hour day). Also includes those working in fishing vessels. Estimates for this population includes 41,104 people.

Access to Vaccine: This population has access using the open to all scheduling applications. Additionally, some sites may have coordinated employee clinics to vaccinate staff in order to improve vaccine uptake and provide convenience to the hourly employees. Employers may coordinate with vaccine providers or LHJs to coordinate on-site clinics.





Agricultural Worker Testing Initiative 2021 Growing Season: Entrance

General Information

To help reduce the spread of COVID-19 in temporary worker housing units, the Washington State Department of Health is offering agricultural employers, growers, and housing operators an opportunity to have workers tested when they arrive in Washington. Recognizing that workers will be travelling from a number of communities in their home countries or from other states to live in congregate housing, DOH urges participation in this program. Together, we can promote a healthy start to the 2021 growing season.

Interested employers, growers, and housing operators are able to arrange on-site testing of workers within the first week after arrival and a follow-up test about seven days later. The department has contracted with Medical Teams International (MTI) to meet the anticipated need. MTI has testing teams ready and available to rapidly deploy mobile testing sites throughout the state.

Due to factors including irregular arrival patterns, delayed arrivals, and unforeseen circumstances, *neither DOH nor MTI make any guarantee that testing will be available at a specific time or place*. The department will attempt to coordinate with local health jurisdictions to fill in as many gaps possible.

Agricultural Worker Testing Support


- Objective: testing opportunities for agricultural workers preparing to return to farms in Washington State
- Working with Medical Teams International to provide testing and agricultural worker outreach
- Entering farmworkers will be tested twice, one week apart
 - Testing should begin as close to arrival as possible
- Testing is being completed with Abbott BinaxNOW antigen test (results in 15 minutes)
- PCR tests are available for those who are symptomatic and the antigen test comes back negative

Testing Phased Approach



Phases I and II

- 50% of COVID-19 outbreaks in the agriculture and food industry reported to DOH in 2020 occurred in <u>Chelan</u>, <u>Douglas</u>, <u>Grant</u>, <u>Yakima</u>, <u>Benton</u>, <u>and Franklin</u>. These are the Phase I counties.
- Additional 16% of COVID-19 outbreaks occurred in <u>Skagit</u>, <u>Okanogan</u>, <u>Adams</u>, and <u>Klickitat</u>. These are the Phase II counties.





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
Main Branches of Testing

- 2. MTI will work in partnership with local health jurisdictions to coordinate additional testing efforts
