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Page 3 BE IT REMEMBERED that on Thursday, November 1 21, 2024, commencing at 9:02 a.m., via Microsoft Teams, 2 LTSS Rulemaking Stakeholder Meeting, taken before Bethan 3 4 Williams, Certified Court Reporter in and for the State of Washington. 5 6 7 The following proceedings took place: 8 MS. BENHAM: Okay. Good morning and welcome, 9 10 everyone. My name is Janette Benham, and I'm the 11 rules coordinator for the leave and care division 12 at the Employment Security Department. There are 13 other members from the leave and care policy and 14 rules team on the call, and I'll ask that they 15 introduce themselves now. 16 MR. CAIN: Good morning. I'm Brett Cain. Ι 17 am with the rules and policy unit for the leave and 18 care division here at ESD. Welcome, everyone. 19 MR. BARRETT: Good morning. My name is Jason 20 Barrett. I'm the lead policy analyst for the leave 21 and care division of ESD, and we appreciate you 22 being with us this morning. 23 Thank you. We're here this MS. BENHAM: 24 morning to review and discuss draft rules the 25 department's considering regarding the WA Cares

Page 4 Program. I want to also let everyone know that 1 this meeting is being recorded. 2 The rules we'll be discussing today are: 3 4 Chapter 192-900 WAC - definitions. Revisions include three new definitions. 5 WAC 192-800-015 - sections of general 6 7 procedural rules for appeal under Chapter 192-800 8 WAC apply. And Chapter 192-940 WAC - qualified 9 10 individuals. This is a new chapter and includes 11 two new rules. 12 If you've called in for this meeting, please 13 keep your mute on by using the mute function on 14 your phone or by pressing star 6. Please keep in 15 mind that the subject of this call is draft rules I 16 just referenced. We will not be discussing other 17 rules, and if you have a question about a Paid Family and Medical Leave claim or application, 18 19 please hang up and call our customer care team at 20 (833) 717-2237. 21 I also want to ask that if you're commenting 22 on the proposed rules to please state and spell your name and indicate if you are here on behalf of 23 24 an organization. And I again want to remind 25 everyone that this meeting is being recorded.

Page 5 The drafts that we'll be reviewing and 1 discussing can be found online at 2 esd.wa.gov/newsroom/rulemaking -- all one word --3 4 /ltss. When you see "Rules Under Development," click on the draft rules for each subject to view 5 the text of the changes being discussed. After 6 7 clicking on the hyperlink for each subject, you can 8 use your browser's back button to go back to the 9 rulemaking page. Before we open the floor for comments, I want 10 11 to give folks an opportunity to ask any questions 12 about anything I just discussed, why we're here, 13 where to find the draft rules, or any other general 14 questions. Go ahead and unmute yourself using your 15 computer or press star 6 on your phone if you'd 16 like to ask any questions. 17 (NO RESPONSE.) 18 MS. BENHAM: Okay. Let's start with draft 19 amendments to Chapter 192-900 WAC - definitions. 20 There are three new rules added to this chapter. The first is WAC 192-900-040 out-of-state 21 22 participant. This rule defines an out-of-state participant as an individual who has elected 23 24 coverage under RCW 50B.04.180. It refers to people 25 who move outside of Washington and elect to

Page 6 continue WA Cares coverage. 1 2 Are there any questions or comments on this rule? 3 4 (NO RESPONSE.) MS. BENHAM: Okay. Hearing none, we can move 5 6 on to the next one. 7 The next is WAC 192-900-045 qualified 8 individual. This rule defines a qualified individual as someone who has met the requirements 9 10 under RCW 50B.04.050 and Chapter 192-940 WAC. Both 11 of these references outline the details of 12 contribution requirements to qualify for the 13 benefit. 14 Are there any questions or comments on this 15 rule? Please feel free to unmute yourselves or 16 press star 6 on your phone if you'd like to ask a 17 question or comment. 18 (NO RESPONSE.) MS. BENHAM: We will move on to the last 19 20 definition in this chapter. It's WAC 192-900-050 21 Year. This rule defines a year as a calendar year beginning on January 1st and ending on 22 23 December 31st. 24 Are there any questions or comments on this 25 rule?

(NO RESPONSE.)

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MS. BENHAM: All right. We'll now move on to 2 WAC 192-925-015 sections of general procedural 3 rules for appeal under Chapter 192-800 WAC apply. 4 This amendment adds a reference to a Paid Family 5 and Medical Leave rule to ensure the processes and 6 7 procedures for the department to address appeals 8 align between both programs that the leave and care division manages. 9 10 Alignment is required under RCW 50B.04.120. 11 The referenced section, WAC 192-800-155, 12 specifically outlines what proceedings are open to 13 the public and what information is publicly 14 disclosable. 15 Are there any questions or comments on this 16 rule? 17 (NO RESPONSE.) 18 MS. BENHAM: Okay. We'll move on to the new 19 Chapter 192-940 WAC gualified individuals. There 20 are two new rules in this chapter. The first is 21 WAC 192-940-005 earning years to become a qualified 2.2 individual. This rule outlines what wages and 23 hours will be used in the determination of years 24 earned toward qualified individual status, how the 25 hours will be determined in a year, and specifies

Page 8 that wages and hours reported when an individual 1 2 had an approved exemption don't count toward qualifying for the benefit. 3 Are there any questions or comments on this 4 rule? 5 6 (NO RESPONSE.) 7 MS. BENHAM: All right. The last section is 8 WAC 192-940-010 how will the department determine if someone is a qualified individual? This rule 9 10 outlines the three different options available for 11 someone to become a qualified individual, outlines 12 the circumstances in which someone could continue 13 to earn years toward becoming a qualified 14 individual, clarifies that people may not exceed 15 the maximum lifetime benefit amount, and that 16 people who have approved exemptions cannot become 17 qualified individuals. Are there any questions or comments on this 18 19 rule? 20 (NO RESPONSE.) 21 MS. BENHAM: That was the final rule in this 22 rulemaking package that we wanted to ask for 23 questions or comments on. 24 Are there any questions or comments related to 25 any of the draft rules we've discussed today? If

Page 9 so, feel free to go back and let us know which rule 1 you're commenting on. 2 MS. CASTRO: Hi, Janette. This is Veronica 3 4 Castro. MS. BENHAM: Hi, Veronica. 5 MS. CASTRO: Hi, I am representing QuickBooks 6 7 Payroll today, and I want to just make a comment 8 and I'm glad that this rulemaking is starting early and I know that it has been on our radar to keep 9 tabs on in terms of changes. 10 11 And I think the question is are there going to 12 be additional rules that outline the reporting 13 requirements for these out-of-state participants, 14 and if so, when can we expect those? 15 From a payroll perspective and from a 16 third-party payroll provider perspective, we are 17 always kind of curious to see how this is going to 18 impact the payroll reporting that employers are 19 required to file and what changes that may bring to 20 the existing requirements. 21 MS. BENHAM: Those are great questions, and 22 thank you for asking them. Your first question: Are there going to be additional rules for 23 24 out-of-state participants? The answer to that is 25 yes, and we are trying to wade through what

requirements we need to put into rule for the out-of-state participants and that is for people who elect coverage out of state.

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4 Some of the things that we are looking at -when people move out of state, they are going to be 5 required to report their wages in hours, they're 6 7 going to be responsible for that report, whether or 8 not they have employer assistance with that is 9 something that we are trying to work out and we have come up with a few ideas about that and it may 10 11 consist of a form that they request their employer 12 to fill out, and for self-employed people it may 13 consist of just verification of wages. We don't 14 know exactly what that looks like yet.

15 One of the -- one of the snags we're running 16 into is we don't have authority over employers who 17 are out of state, and so there may be a situation 18 where someone moves out of state and they have a 19 Washington employer and that Washington employer 20 may help them with their reporting, but the 21 individual is going to be responsible for that 22 reporting. It's not going to be the employer 23 responsible for that.

And I just want to invite you if you have questions or ideas on how that could work better,

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Page 11 I'd like to invite you to let me know and I'd be 1 happy to have a discussion with you about that. 2 And that's part of the reason that we don't 3 4 have that in these rules right now is because there are so many nuances to reporting for individuals 5 out of state. So we're going to be looking at that 6 7 in the future, in the near future, and we are going 8 to be opening another rules package when we have more information and a really good process -- the 9 best process we can come up with for how these 10 11 individuals are going to be reporting to us. 12 So I'd encourage you to reach out to me if you 13 want to -- if you have ideas about that or if you 14 want to have more of a discussion about that. 15 So your last question was third-party payroll, 16 how it impacts and changes. And I think the first 17 question that I answered helps answer that question 18 too. We just don't have specifics of what this is 19 going to look like. 20 Does that help? 21 MS. CASTRO: Yes, yes, it does. And I think a 22 quick follow-up question, it sounds like the agency, then, is thinking about the out-of-state 23 24 contributions to be managed outside of payroll, is 25 that correct -- a correct assumption?

Page 12 MS. BENHAM: Outside of payroll, do you mean 1 outside of payroll and reporting as you currently 2 3 do for state employees here in Washington? 4 MS. CASTRO: So today the Washington Cares contribution, the employee contributions are 5 managed through a payroll -- you know, a payroll 6 7 tax. So that's something that we as a payroll provider help track and facilitate payments and 8 9 help reporting for. For these out-of-state employee contributions 10 11 or -- yeah, contributions I'm going to call them, 12 these are going to be something that if I, say, 13 live in Oregon and want to contribute to the WA 14 Cares, I would then just mail a check in for myself 15 to your agency, or is that something that the 16 employer in Oregon will have to track as well on 17 my -- on my paycheck? 18 MS. BENHAM: It's going to be the 19 individual --20 MS. CASTRO: Okay. 21 MS. BENHAM: -- because we don't -- yeah, 22 you've got that exactly right. That's how we're looking at it now because we don't have the 23 24 authority to enforce employers outside of the state 25 to report under our payroll reporting system.

MS. CASTRO: Makes sense. I would also 1 encourage you -- we are part of the National 2 3 Reporting -- Payroll Reporting Consortium, NPRC. 4 This is a payroll trade association among others like ourselves QuickBooks Payroll, ADP, Paychex, 5 Gusto, for example, are also part of this 6 7 organization, and we are happy to entertain and provide feedback in terms of, you know, any type of 8 9 rulemaking and changes that your agency is thinking, even though you confirmed that these 10 11 would not be handled through a payroll tax 12 deduction like the traditional WA Cares employee 13 contributions are.

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14 But if you are looking for broad, I think, you 15 know, feedback or just as a sounding board, we are 16 happy to provide that. And if you'd like, I can 17 send you the information of the contact who leads 18 these meetings and we can schedule something in the 19 near future and we can, you know, maybe have a 20 conversation about the potential rules that you're 21 looking to entertain.

MS. BENHAM: That would be really helpful, and if you could send -- e-mail me that contact information, that would be great. You can send that to rules@esd.wa.gov.

Page 14 MS. CASTRO: Perfect. Can you post that in 1 chat? Can I ask you to do that just to make sure 2 that I've got your information? 3 MS. BENHAM: I have chat turned off for this 4 meeting. 5 6 MS. CASTRO: Okay. 7 MS. BENHAM: It's rules, R-U-L-E-S, 8 @esd.wa.gov. 9 MS. CASTRO: Okay. Perfect. Thank you. 10 MS. BENHAM: Thanks. Really appreciate your 11 input and helpful comments too. 12 Is there anyone else who has any questions or 13 comments on any of the rules that we have discussed 14 today? 15 All right. With that, we will close out. 16 Thank you for attending this morning. 17 Regarding next steps, we will gather all the 18 comments we've received and we might be getting 19 some comments by e-mail also and we'll determine 20 which should be incorporated and then draft 21 paperwork to formally propose the rule language. Once the proposed rules and paperwork are filed 22 23 with the Office of the Code Reviser, individuals 24 will have an opportunity to participate in a public 25 hearing and provide written comments up to and

Page 15 through the day of the hearing. 1 2 Following the hearing, if no substantive changes to the rules are necessary, we will file 3 4 paperwork providing a response to each comment received during the formal comment period and 5 hearing and then we will adopt the rules. 6 7 Please visit 8 esd.wa.gov/newsroom/rulemaking/ltss for more information when these next steps occur.
