Welcome and Opening Remarks

UI State Legislative and Rulemaking Update

2022 New Bills of Interest

- HB 1612 Technical corrections to unemployment tax rate statutes.
- SB 5783 Re-establishing the underground economy task force.
- SB 5873/HB 2031 Across the board reduction in social tax cap in 2022 and 2023; social tax cut for small business in 2023.

Additional UI Bills of Interest

- HB 1486 Changes to voluntary quit laws and able/available standards targeted at caregivers.
- SB 5438 Unemployment benefits for undocumented workers. *Note*: Implementing a 2021 proviso, ESD completed a <u>report</u> on the topic to the Legislature.

Rulemaking Agenda

- Making phase 1, 3 and 4 of emergency rules permanent.

UI Program Implementation Update

Disaster Unemployment Assistance November Northwest WA Flooding

- On January 5th, President Biden declared a major disaster for the November floods and mudslides in the northwest corner of Washington.
- Affected areas include:
 - ➢ Clallam County
 - ➢ Whatcom County
 - Skagit County
 - Lummi Nation
 - ➢ Nooksack Indian Tribe
 - ➢ Quileute Tribe
- Workers who live or work in these areas and are unemployed as a direct result of the disaster may be eligible for Disaster Unemployment Assistance or DUA.

What is Disaster Unemployment Assistance?

- DUA provides income support to workers who do not qualify for regular unemployment insurance.
- This can include workers who do not have enough covered employment to qualify for a claim, those who have exhausted their regular UI eligibility, or other reasons related to the disaster.
- This program is very similar to Pandemic Unemployment Assistance, which expanded eligibility for income support benefits during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

• We do not yet have a timeline for when we will be accepting applications for DUA, but we expect to have information available on our website in the next couple weeks.

Other Upcoming UI Program Implementation

- Mixed Earners Unemployment Compensation (MEUC)
- <u>UIPL 16-20, Change 5</u>, which expanded PUA eligibility to include three COVID-19 related reasons under which an individual may self-certify:
 - 1. Individuals who refuse to return to work that is unsafe or to accept an offer of new work that is unsafe;
 - 2. Certain individuals providing services to educational institutions or educational service agencies; and
 - 3. Individuals experiencing a reduction of hours or a temporary or permanent layoff.
