


H-2A Job Order & Tracking

TESTING VACCINATION UPDATE -AGRICULTURAL WORKERS July 15, 2021


Agricultural Worker Testing Support

- Objective: testing opportunities for agricultural workers preparing to return to farms in Washington State
- Working with Medical Teams International to provide testing and agricultural worker outreach
- Entering farmworkers will be tested twice, one week apart
 Testing should begin as close to arrival as possible
- Testing is being completed with Abbott BinaxNOW antigen test (results in 15 minutes)
- PCR tests are available for those who are symptomatic, and the antigen test comes back negative

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Main Branches of Testing

- 1. MTI will provide on-site testing at farms or temporary worker housing for incoming seasonal migrant agricultural workers
- 2. MTI will work in partnership with local health jurisdictions to coordinate additional testing efforts
- 3. Local health jurisdictions and community health centers are already providing additional testing supports
- 4. Expanding testing efforts to provide outbreak support
- 5. Explore interest in departure testing for migrant and H2A workers
- 6. Investigate use of OTC testing technology in Ag settings to expand access

Successes and Challenges

• Successes:

- MTI: Conducted over 100 vaccine clinics with 3,668 total vaccinations
- Some LHJs have reported that they have reached saturation of population interested in receiving vaccination
- A lot of community outreach and educational efforts underway in collaboration with Community Based Organizations (CBOs)
 - Community based pop-up clinics
- Challenges:
 - Vaccine hesitancy for the remaining unvaccinated population is our biggest challenge


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Care-A-Van

• Site Prioritization

- The Care-A-Van serves communities disproportionately impacted by COVID-19. Requests that cover multiple priority areas below will be given higher priority:
- Counties with higher vaccine gaps by race/ethnicity.
- Communities with a high rank on the Social Vulnerability Index (SVI) for COVID-19.
- Sectors with recent outbreaks.
- Communities overrepresented in COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations, and deaths.
- Demographic groups with lower vaccination rates compared to other groups.
- Groups not represented or underrepresented in current DOH data systems that have likely experienced COVID-19 health disparities and vaccine inequities.
- Geographic locations that have not had a visit from the DOH Care-A-Van.
