

Washington State Business Employment Dynamics

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From January 2024 to March 2024, **gross job gains** from opening and expanding private-sector establishments in Washington amounted to 172,535, a decrease of 6,061 jobs from the previous quarter, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Over this period, **gross job losses** from closing and contracting private-sector establishments were 160,252, a decrease of 2,210 jobs from the previous quarter. The difference between the number of gross job gains and the number of gross job losses yielded a **net employment gain** of 12,283 jobs in the private sector during the first quarter of 2024 (see *Figures 1* and *2*). These numbers show the key changes in private sector employment, also called Business Employment Dynamics (BED).

Figure 1. Quarterly gross job gains and losses, seasonally adjusted, Washington state, 2014 Q1 through 2024 Q1



The change in the number of jobs over time is the net result of increases and decreases in employment that occur at all private businesses in the economy. BED statistics track these changes in employment at private-sector establishments from the third month of one quarter to the third month of the next. The difference between the number of gross job gains and the number of gross job losses is the net change in employment. The BED data series includes gross job gains and gross job losses by industry subsector for the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands, as well as gross job gains and gross job losses at the firm level by employer size class. The most recent BED data covers events through the first quarter of 2024.

Net employment changes in Washington trend similarly to the nation. In the first quarter of 2024, Washington's net employment gain was 12,283 or 0.4% of total employment. Nationally, the percentage change was slightly lower at 0.3%.

Nationally and statewide, the third quarter 2023 business employment dynamics signaled weakness in the labor market, with gross job losses outpacing gross job gains. In the subsequent two quarters, employment gains outpaced losses, continuing the established trend of quarterly net job growth since 2020.


Gross job gains

In the first quarter of 2024, gross job gains represented 5.7% of private-sector employment in Washington. Gross job gains are the sum of increases in employment due to expansions at existing establishments and the addition of new jobs at opening establishments. Gross job gains at expanding establishments totaled 148,679 in the first quarter of 2024, a decrease of 6,716 jobs compared to the previous quarter. Opening establishments accounted for 23,856 million of the jobs gained in the first quarter of 2024, an increase of 655 jobs from the previous quarter (see *Figures 3* and *4*).

Gross job losses


In the first quarter of 2024, gross job losses represented 5.3% of private-sector employment. Gross job losses are the result of contractions in employment at existing establishments and the loss of jobs at closing establishments. Contracting establishments lost 145,711 jobs in the first quarter of 2024, an increase of 720 jobs from the prior quarter. In the first quarter of 2024, closing establishments lost 14,541 jobs, a decrease of 2,930 jobs from the previous quarter (see *Figures 3* and *4*).

Establishment births and deaths

In the first quarter of 2024, the number of establishment births (a subset of the openings data) increased by 560. These new establishments accounted for an increase of 1,522 jobs from the previous quarter. Data for establishment deaths (a subset of the closings data) are available through the second quarter of 2023, when 14,333 jobs were lost at 3,375 establishments.



Industries

Gross job gains exceeded gross job losses in eight out of the 11 industry sectors detailed in this report in the first quarter of 2024. The largest net increases were observed in education and health services, leisure and hospitality, retail trade, and construction. The three sectors reporting net losses were transportation and warehousing, information, and financial activities (see *Figure 6*).

States

Gross job gains in the first quarter of 2024 surpassed gross job losses in 47 states, including Puerto Rico and Washington DC. Gross job losses surpassed job gains in five states. Washington state had the 13th highest net job gains in the nation.
