Rulemaking



- Address Change Requirement We are adding an explicit requirement that employers provide their new address to the Department within 30 days after an address change.
 We filed the CR 102 to formally propose the rules. Hearing will be on March 27 at 10:00.
- Space Force We are updating the rule on mandatory military transfers to include all members of the U.S. Armed Forces, including Space Force. We have filed the CR 102; hearing will be on March 6 at 9:00 AM.
- Rescinding Withdrawal of Appeal Working on a process and standard of review for situations where a claimant or employer withdraws an appeal and later wishes to request to reinstate the appeal. We filed the CR 103. Rule will become effective on March 8.

Question from John Glynn: Concerning mass layoff relocation term. Was that the one that's parallel to the Warren Act, where have an employer's report?

Answer from Josh Dye: Yeah, it's yes. The Washington Warn Act, there are a few differences, but for the most part it's a lot of the bill, rather I should say, is adding one act to state law, and then it goes a little bit farther. They both include a requirement to cover health care. For the other thing I'll mention on the 1313 to 5525. There was a mention, in public testimony, that ESD would analyze the data and we just kind of want to go on. Our current plan is to collect the data, make it available. But we would not be doing under the current draft. We wouldn't do any analysis. We would just make sure that the information that's provided to us is made available to the public good.

Question from Julia Gorton: Hello! I know that the public isn't able to ask questions, so I think I will ask the question in the chat. Is there a public fiscal note for 5041 available. It doesn't appear to be on the legislative website.

Answer from Josh Dye: Yeah. There's been some snags with it on somehow the technical aspects of it. They are working on it so it should be available, both the original bill has a fiscal note and the substitute. I'm hoping, they're going to be available any day now. They are with OFM. Then for mentioned for the student disqualification for UI. One of the things that I think was mentioned in testimony, and just to kind of reiterate. In most cases, is, repealing the student disqualification would not really change a lot of the process. We currently, for anyone who is flagged as school follow up with them. So, they get flagged for an adjudicator, they followed up and if they confirm that they are willing to accept work, to leave, enroll and accept work, so they are able and available then they would qualify for UI. The same requirements will pretty much be in effect where they still have to be able and

available for work, actively seeking work and all the other what this would do is just making that if they are enrolled in school. It's not an automatic disqualification and again, are currently they get flagged for disqualification. But we follow up with every claimant.

Question from Julia Gorton: Is it sort of the same situation with the part time workers bill, that it's not significantly different.

Answer from Josh Dye: Yeah, with part time workers, one of the interesting parts, I guess we'll say, is we don't currently have very good data to figure out who would be considered part time workers. We kind of had to do a little bit of mathematical guesstimations, if you will, to look at some of the USDOL data. We basically just get how many hours per quarter they work. We're looking at it. It does make such a substantive change to the part time worker eligibility, though. Currently part-time workers, in order to be to qualify as a part time eligible worker, you cannot work more than 17 hours in any week. Which is probably the largest barrier for those particular claimants. This would have some substantive changes to the definition of part time eligible workers. What we do not expect is a lot of additional claims to be filed. We're still kind of working through that. But it would potentially lead to more claims being approved. But we don't see a huge spike in applications.

Question from Julia Gorton: On 1773 and 5626. I know it creates a wage replacement program outside of UI. But are you hearing anything from the Federal administration about what they may or may not do, or what consequences, if any there may be in Washington.

Answer from Josh Dye: Yeah, that's the good question. We did connect with USDOL over the summer. ESD, we were given some money at last year's budget to stand up a work group to look at the funding mechanism. We connected with USDOL and the language for the funding mechanism, is as far as we can tell, within the conformity. It kind of mirrors a little bit of what Colorado did and so that's the reason some of the funding language in that bill gets a little, looks a little odd, just trying to hit those marks. We'll say that again that was over this past summer so I cannot provide any input about any of the current administration's views of it.

Answer from Josh Dye: Our understanding is no. The way it is currently constructed, it would not have any Federal oversight.
